Quarterly Con-versation: Springtime in Prison

The birds are chirping, the temperature in A block is a tropical 45 degrees, community service workers scurry from building to building, and more and more tourists poke their heads into the Wyoming Frontier Prison offices asking, "Are you open?" This is what spring is like in our prison museum, affectionately known as the Old Pen. This is a very busy time of year for us because we're gearing up for the opening day of our full tour season in addition to the constant efforts to improve our historic site for the enjoyment of our visitors.

We've kicked off the year with a bang; the ability to provide two tours Monday through Thursday, every week this winter, has increased our tour revenue by 122% in the first quarter of this year, compared to the first quarter of last year. There also appears to be an increase in interest from special school groups; we have tours scheduled in May for approximately 200 young minds in addition to regular visitation.

Our full tour season begins the Saturday of Memorial Day weekend, May 29th, during which we offer 9 tours a day, 7 days a week. This summer we will also be offering special Night Tours on the weekends, as well as Friday the 13th Tours in August, and we will undoubtedly be visited by several paranormal investigative groups. In addition to visitation increasing, we've been busy making all sorts of improvements around our site.

Just last week, our onsite "Well #1" came to life to help provide the water required to plant 90 seedling trees last weekend to replace the trees lost in the beetle kill along the walking path. We had a lot of volunteers come to plant trees, including the wonderful folks from On Sacred Ground as well as Erica Royer's 6th Grade Class from Rawlins Middle School. The trees were purchased with grant funds awarded last year from the Carbon County School District #1 Recreation Board, and the 90 seedlings will only be the beginning. An additional 65 more established trees of 13 different types will be planted in the fall, and a drip watering system will be installed. Our nature area will soon be restored to its picturesque state to be enjoyed by all who happen by on the city walking path.

In addition to the physical work we've been doing, we've also received funding and been approved to purchase three new software packages that will continue to increase the efficiency of this organization. The Old Pen Joint Powers Board approved the purchase of the Adobe CS4 Creative Suite (which Sarah is extremely excited about), and we have already purchased QuickBooks PremierPro to

This software was purchased from Tech Soup, an organization that provides software to nonprofits, at a fraction of the original cost. We're very excited about these programs, but the most significant purchase will be made with grant funds received from the Colorado Wyoming Association of Museums (CWAM). The funds will be used to purchase PastPerfect, software dedicated to cataloguing artifacts while adhering to the highest museum standards. The Wyoming Frontier Prison possesses roughly 2,000 artifacts that have not previously been catalogued in any way. This is a large project that may take several years, but it's something that is long overdue, and we're excited to get started!

Reports from the Warden: Grants

Twelve percent of the Wyoming Frontier Prison's 2010 budget needs to come from grants. So far, Old Pen Staff members have submitted five grant applications.

The first grant of the year was written to the Colorado Wyoming Association of Museums (CWAM) for \$750 to purchase Past Perfect Software. Happily, we have received noticed that we were awarded this grant. With this software, Old Pen staff will begin the long overdue task of cataloguing the precious artifacts in our museum collections.

The next grant was to the Carbon County Visitors' Council, requesting \$6,000 to continue renting our two billboards. The large, attractive boards are an integral piece of marketing for the Wyoming Frontier Prison and a piece we would not be able to afford without the Visitors' Council's assistance. Once again, good fortune smiled on us, and we were awarded this grant.

In March we submitted two grant applications to the Carbon County School District #1 Recreation Board. The first application requests \$8,500 to produce 50,000 brochures and 10,000 rack cards for the Wyoming Frontier Prison. The brochures provide historic information to our visitors and they are a great training tool for tour guides. The beautiful rack cards would be a brand new piece of our marketing program. The rack cards would provide potential visitors with the standard information they would need to include the Wyoming Frontier Prison in their travel plans.

The second application to the Recreation Board asks for \$45,000 to restore the historic baseball field in the prison recreation yard. The Old Pen Joint Powers Board hopes to partner with the South Central Baseball-Softball Commission to get the old baseball field back in working order. We would like to restore the field for three reasons: historic interpretation, to host vintage baseball games as a fund-raising activity, and to make our historic site more accessible to local citizens. We will not know the outcome of the Recreation Board applications until sometime in July. We will keep you posted!

And finally, a grant was just submitted to the Wyoming Cultural Trust Fund requesting \$6,950.00 to upgrade our museum display cases and training for an exhibit upgrade project. If awarded, the grant will allow us to purchase supplies to upgrade the existing display cases to a conservation standard and to make them more accessible to our visitors. The project will also include continued staff training on the proper care of our collections.

As you can tell for the varied grant applications so far submitted, operating an historic site entails many different aspects from marketing, historic restoration and preservation, recreation, museum and collections care, and staff training (among other things!) Please keep your fingers crossed that we may be awarded all of grants we requested!

Inmate Snapshot



Name: Henry Edmonson

Age: 40 Number: 377

Date of sentence: April 16, 1898

Legnth of sentence: Life Crime: 2nd Degree Murder

Details: Arrested in Uinta County, sentenced to life in prison in 1898, and began serving his sentence at the Wyoming Territorial Prison in Laramie. He was transferred to the State Pennitentiary in Rawlins when it opened in 1901. Listed as a "heavy drinker" and "morphine fiend" he was granted a pardon by Governor John B. Kendrick on December 22, 1915 on the condition that he leave Wyoming forever.
